Introduction:

This Litter Management Plan has been produced by Carlow County Council in accordance with the *Litter Pollution Act 1997*, as amended, and replaces the “*Carlow County Council Litter Management Plan 2021 – 2023*”.

A review of the latter Plan was carried out in the preparation of this draft plan and a summary is contained in Appendix 1.

The Draft County Carlow Litter Management Plan 2024 - 2026 is set out in six sections, as outlined below:

1. What is Litter

The *Litter Pollution Act 1997*, as amended, identifies Litter as:

“a substance or object, whether or not intended as waste, that, when deposited in a place other than a litter receptacle or other place lawfully designated for the deposit, is or is likely to become unsightly, deleterious, nauseous or unsanitary, whether by itself or with any other such substance or object, and regardless of its size or volume or the extent of the deposit.”


Some of the commonly misunderstood examples of litter in Co. Carlow include:

- Litter on top of, beside, or hanging from, a litter bin – if it’s full, find the next one, or bring it home.
- Cigarette butts – these contain plastic, as well as toxic chemicals which negatively impact the environment.
- Vapes – an emerging litter issue, that should be recycled in battery recycling bins.
- Dog foul – often unavoidable for wheelchair users, mobility scooters, and buggies, as well as being a health hazard to other dogs and children.
- Fly-posting (including temporary signs/posters without permits) – easy to put up, but also easy to forget to take back down.
- Graffiti – tagging of signs, sculptures, street furniture, buildings and walls.
- Food waste – attracts vermin and often does not have the appropriate composting conditions to breakdown e.g. a banana skin on a footpath.

2. Current status of Litter in Co. Carlow

Litter in County Carlow is monitored annually as part of the National Litter Pollution Monitoring System. According to the most recent figures available (2022), over half of Co. Carlow (51%) is Litter-Free, with the remaining 49% classed as “Slightly Polluted”. This is an improvement since the last Plan, when only 40% was classed as “Litter-Free”, and 1% was classed as “Moderately Polluted.”

The breakdown of litter composition in Co. Carlow in 2022 can be seen below. This reflects a significant reduction in the proportion of “Cigarette Related Litter” since the last Plan, when it was almost 70%, and much higher than the national average.



3. Legislative requirements for inclusion in the Litter Management Plan

The *Litter Pollution Act 1997*, as amended, requires that every Litter Management Plan includes the following information:

- (a) such objectives as the local authority deems are appropriate to prevent and control litter in its functional area,
- (b) measures to encourage public awareness with a view to eliminating litter pollution, including educational and information measures directed at young persons,
- (c) measures or arrangements that are to be undertaken by the local authority in order to attain the objectives of the plan, and
- (d) information on, or formulated having regard to—
 - (i) an appraisal of all existing litter prevention and control programmes being operated by the local authority,
 - (ii) the policies and objectives of the local authority in relation to the prevention and control of litter,
 - (iii) the measures which, in so far as the local authority can determine, will or may be taken during the relevant period by persons other than the local authority for the purposes of preventing and controlling litter,
 - (iv) the facilities at which waste may be deposited by members of the public for recovery or disposal within the meaning of the Waste Management Act, 1996, as amended,
 - (v) the steps to be taken by the local authority to enforce the provisions of this Act in its functional area, and
 - (vi) any incidental and ancillary matters.

These legislative requirements have been incorporated into the foregoing and following Sections of this Litter Management Plan.

4. Description of a Litter Conscious Citizen?

Are you:

- Someone who knows what littering is and what constitutes litter – cigarette butts, vapes, food waste (e.g. banana skin on footpath), dog foul, fly-posting (including temporary signs/posters without permits), graffiti, etc.?
- Someone who actively avoids littering – uses public bins (not overflowing ones) or preferably brings litter home to recycle/dispose correctly, picks up after their dog?
- Someone who encourages/reprimands those in their immediate zone of influence, e.g. parents, grandparents, childminders, friends?
- Someone who reports littering to Carlow County Council correctly (not on social media), and supports them insofar as possible?
- Someone who actively litter picks themselves, or who contributes in any way to community clean-ups (from tea-making to transport)?

If Yes, thank you, and keep up the good work.

If No, please contact Carlow County Council's Environment Department, to help identify and address the barriers preventing same, noting that you have a **Personal Legal Responsibility** under Part II of the *Litter Pollution Act 1997* to prevent litter.



5. Objectives:

This Litter Management Plan contains 14 Objectives, under the headings of:

- Education and Awareness,
- Community and Business Involvement,
- Services and Facilities provided by Carlow County Council, and
- Monitoring and Enforcement.

These are set out below.

5.1: Education & Awareness

5.1.1: To use the National Litter Pollution Monitoring System to inform priorities for an annual education and awareness campaign, in addition to the “Litter Conscious Citizen” description outlined above.

5.1.2: To reinforce the core “Anti-Litter” message and actions of the Green Schools Litter & Waste Flag among all Carlow primary and secondary schools, colleges, and other educational centres, irrespective of current Green School status.

5.1.3: To work with all voluntary and business groups in their efforts to promote and deliver a litter-free Carlow, with increased emphasis on graffiti and flyposting.

5.1.4: Continue to review and avail of opportunities for raising awareness, including festivals and events, and avail of new and novel approaches to awareness, such as street art.

5.1.5: To increase access of litter awareness information to all sections of society, i.e. that messaging is widely available in relevant languages and formats.

5.2: Community & Business Involvement

5.2.1: To encourage multi agency cooperation, shared learning and partnerships to positively impact on litter.

5.2.2: To assist community and business groups in their clean-up campaigns, i.e. through provision of equipment (including equipment to tackle fly-posting and graffiti), coordination of disposal, promotion of campaigns, and acknowledgement of efforts (e.g. Carlow’s Pride of Place).

5.2.3: Ensure all businesses are aware of their legal responsibilities in relation to litter within the curtilage of their premises, and litter created by their staff and customers, with increased emphasis on fly-posting, and continued emphasis on cigarette litter.

5.2.4: Bring to the attention of, and provide relevant evidence to school principals, where secondary schools and colleges are identified as the source of lunch-time litter issues.

5.3: Services and Facilities provided by Carlow County Council

5.3.1: Continue to review and improve the distribution and availability of litter bins locally, and maintain a regular cleansing service in Carlow's towns and villages, in line with the agreed annual service plans produced by the Municipal Districts.

5.3.2: Continue to improve recycling and waste disposal facilities (including upkeep of same), and upgrade to best practice models as resources allow.

5.4: Monitoring & Enforcement

5.4.1: Ensure that all litter complaints received by the council are investigated promptly and in a fair manner, and communicate clearly the steps involved in making a complaint, including the subsequent expectations of complainants (refer to Section 6).

5.4.2: Increase the presence of the Carlow Dog Warden and Environmental Patrol Officers in areas of the county with the highest incidence of complaints.

5.4.3: Continue to provide a committed litter enforcement service, and ensure all legislative measures available to the Local Authority, are applied in their fullest extent to those found responsible for causing litter pollution.

5.4.4: Ensure that all legislative measures which may arise during the lifetime of this Plan, including measures related to the use of CCTV and dog fouling, are availed of at the earliest possible opportunity.

5.4.5: Complete annual returns for the National Litter Pollution Monitoring System and RMCEI.

5.4.6: Monitor emerging litter issues (e.g. disposable vapes) and develop approaches to tackle same on an ongoing basis.

5.4.7: Continue to provide monthly data on litter enforcement actions to the Elected Members of Carlow County Council.

6. How to Make a Litter Complaint and What Happens Next

Reporting a crime is the civic duty of every individual, and littering is a crime.

Carlow County Council provide numerous ways to report a litter pollution incident, including:

Please note that posting incidents on social media, or to a newspaper or radio station, does not constitute making a complaint.

You will be asked to provide your name and contact number, which will remain strictly confidential, as well as details regarding your environmental complaint. We need this information to clarify your query and obtain further information. It is not passed to any third party.


When we receive your complaint, we follow the following steps:

1. Log complaint onto the complaints database.
2. Assign it to the relevant personnel, depending on the nature of the complaint and location.
3. The complaint is investigated and a report including photographic evidence and recommendations is submitted to the Environment Department.
4. Fines may issue or a decision may be made for direct prosecution. (Dependant on evidence found or scale of materials found).

Note:

Carlow County Council will not automatically clean up reported litter incidents as we are bound by legislation to provide individuals, within a statutory timeframe, the opportunity to rectify the litter pollution incident that they have caused. To do otherwise would reward such behaviours.

Appendix 1: Review of Carlow County Council's Litter Management Plan 2021-2023



The first steps in preparing the new plan commenced with a review of the activities and objectives presented in the Litter Management Plan 2021-2023.

The existing plan was circulated to all the Elected members for their comments and feedback. Consultation Clinics were held in Carlow Town, Tullow & Bagenalstown Libraries for Tidy Towns & Community Groups. Consultation sessions were held with Carlow Chamber/Love Carlow.

The existing objectives and activities carried out under the 2021-2023 plan were discussed looking at successes and opportunities for improvement. Litter composition surveys, litter fines, waste enforcement and statistical returns on litter/waste were examined in detail to look at how litter has changed in County Carlow.

The feedback from these sessions was incorporated into the draft Plan 2024-2027. A summary of the material reviewed is appended herewith.

Plan 2021-2023 Existing Objectives:

Education & Awareness

To increase the awareness of all young persons in the functional area of Co Carlow of the damage that litter can cause through the promotion of the Anti-Litter message.

Ensure that all pupils in educational facilities around Co Carlow receive a litter awareness programme.

To provide a strong litter awareness campaign through school visits, print media, radio and social media.

To work with all voluntary groups and agencies who have litter awareness within their remit.

To continue to seek out new target audiences and engage directly to promote litter awareness and action.

To encourage multi agency cooperation, shared learning and partnerships to positively impact on litter.

Community & Business Involvement

Continue to provide incentives that assist communities in the work that they do i.e. Carlow's Pride of Place.

Provide financial assistance to communities to help in their clean-up campaigns i.e. Environmental Grants, National Spring Clean.

Maximise co-operation between all who live within the functional area of Carlow County Council and endeavour to engage them in the fight against litter.

Make Carlow's business community more aware of their responsibilities in relation to litter control.

Community & Business Involvement

Continue to provide incentives that assist communities in the work that they do i.e. Carlow's Pride of Place.

Provide financial assistance to communities to help in their clean-up campaigns i.e.

Environmental Grants, National Spring Clean.

Maximise co-operation between all who live within the functional area of Carlow County Council and endeavour to engage them in the fight against litter.

Make Carlow's business community more aware of their responsibilities in relation to litter control.

Services and Facilities provided by Carlow County Council

Continue to work towards keeping the streets of Carlow Town and County clean.

Support communities in their endeavour to recycle.

Provide environmental alternatives to households in terms of waste disposal.

Enforcement

Provide a committed litter enforcement service and enforce the Law pertinent to litter pollution to the fullest extent.

Ensure that all litter complaints received by the council are investigated promptly and in a fair manner

Ensure that Enforcement measures are applied to those found responsible causing litter pollution.

Tackle the problem of abandoned vehicles in Co Carlow

Monitor the levels of litter being generated throughout County Carlow and identify litter black spots that need extra monitoring and care.





**RE: LEGAL NOTICE – SECTION 9 LITTER POLLUTION ACT 1997
CONCERNING YOUR PROPERTY AT CARLOW.**

Dear Sir/Madam,

I wish to inform you that there is an obligation on you under the above Act to remove rubbish, all litter and waste at the property at Carlow and to keep the area free of litter/rubbish.

YOU are now requested to remove these items and to carry out an immediate clean up of the area, before it becomes a Health hazard, please arrange for the removal of items to an authorised landfill site for proper disposal **WITHIN 7 DAYS** and to take all necessary measures to prevent a recurrence of the problem.

FAILURE to comply with this Notice to remove the aforesaid items and clean up the area WITHIN SEVEN DAYS will result in the Council issuing a €150 fine per week until the rubbish is cleaned.

Carlow County Council looks forward to your co-operation to avoid the above course of action.
